- Last shot was fired June 22, 1865

- About 2.2 million men served in the Union forces
- About 1 million men served in the Confederate forces

- Union: 365,000 died; 282,000 wounded; 182,000 captured
- Confederates: 290,000 died; 137,000 wounded; 437,000 captured,
- 80,000 slaves died; 50,000 civilians died




Who fought?

- For the Confederacy, by the end, all able bodied men between 16 and 60.








- Even if you are looking to find the story of one ancestor, it is probably worthwhile to search your tree, and determine who might be a likely candidate.

Start Your Story

James C Donald, was born on 30 Jun 1836.

Three days after Virginia seceded from the union, he enlisted in Company H, Virginia 4th Infantry Regiment on 20 Apr 1861, at the age of 24, three days after Virginia seceded from the Union.

He also served in Company Preston's Virginia 7th Cavalry Regiment and Company G, Virginia 14th Cavalry Regiment.

He was 5 foot 9, had a fair complexion, blue eyes, and light hair. He was a laborer.

He died in Lexington, Virginia on 20 Jul 1899 at the age of 63.


Search For Soldiers

COMPANY "G" 14TH VIRGINIA CAVALRY

This company was largely composed of men already in the service who had re-enlisted before the passage of the "Conscript Law" in April, '62. It was organized some time that summer. Its membership was drawn from the "Stonewall Brigade," principally from the 4th regiment. Nineteen were from Rockbridge, fourteen of whom were members of the Rockbridge Grays.

COMMISSIONED OFFICERS

Captains—Walter R. Preston, of Montgomery Co., was the first Capt., and resigned and was succeeded by Alexander M. Peck, of Montgomery Co., who held the office until the surrender.

Lieutenants—1st, Chas. Norvell, of Lynchburg; 2nd, Chas. Keiffer, of Pulaski Co., (who never did much service with the company, being aide to Gen. Jenkins); 3rd, William W. Cornett, of Grayson Co., who acted in that capacity until the close of hostilities.



Pension Laws

Act of July 14, 1862 - Started the General Law pension system for Civil War veterans who had sustained war-related disabilities. Pensions became available to widows, children under 16 years of age, and dependent relatives of soldiers who died in military service from war related injuries.

Act of January 25,1872 - The veteran or his dependents permitted to collect a lump sum payment based on the date of death or discharge from the service. This payment was in addition to the monthly pension payment.

Act of 1890 - The pension based only on veteran's age and time of service.

Act of February 6, 1907 - Pension approved based on a veteran's age and length of service. [1]

Organization Index

The "Organization Index to Pension Files", an index to pension applications, is available online. Officially called the "Organization Index to Pension Files of Veterans Who Served Between 1861 and 1900" (NARA T289). Despite the name, the records actually cover veterans who served in the US Army between 1861-1917. Each card gives the soldier's name, application and certificate numbers, state of enlistment, and might include rank and death information. The majority of the records are of Civil War veterans, but the collection also includes records for veterans of other wars from the same time period.

General Index

The "General Index to Pension Files" officially the "General Index to Pension Files, 1861-1934" (NARA T288) is available online. This index is similar to the "Organization Index" mentioned above. It is arranged in a different format, however, and the information on the cards is slightly different. The index is arranged by the veteran's or widow's name and his unit, rank, date and application number, certificate number if accepted, and state of filing. As mentioned above, the pension files that this index and the "Organizational Index" refer to have not been filmed and are only available at the National Archives in Washington, D.C.


THE JUBILEE OVER.


