There was a knock at the door.....

The homestead of Grandfather Mills was located on the old Harrison-Batesville Road about midway between the towns of Marshall and Mountain View and was well and favorably regarded. My Grandfather Caleb H. Mills, whose sympathy was with the North during the Civil War, was unmercifully tortured by a lawless band of Jay-hawkers from southern Missouri and finally was shot and killed by them on February 18, 1864. His oldest daughter, Hester E.A. Mills (Aunt Amanda) was also shot by them and died two days later on February 17th. My grandfather was tortured for valuables and when my Aunt Amanda protested and interfered she was shot by the outlaws, who, after continuing the tortures (foot burns) without receiving anything, shot my grandfather who then broke away and ran about one hundred yards where he fell dead. Soon after my grandfather and aunt were murdered, my grandmother moved to Kansas with the other children and remained there until the end of the Civil War when they returned to the old homestead in Arkansas. In this old home, a big log house with spacious front and back porches, my mother was married to my father on November 19, 1871, when she was a few days over eighteen and he was twenty-one.

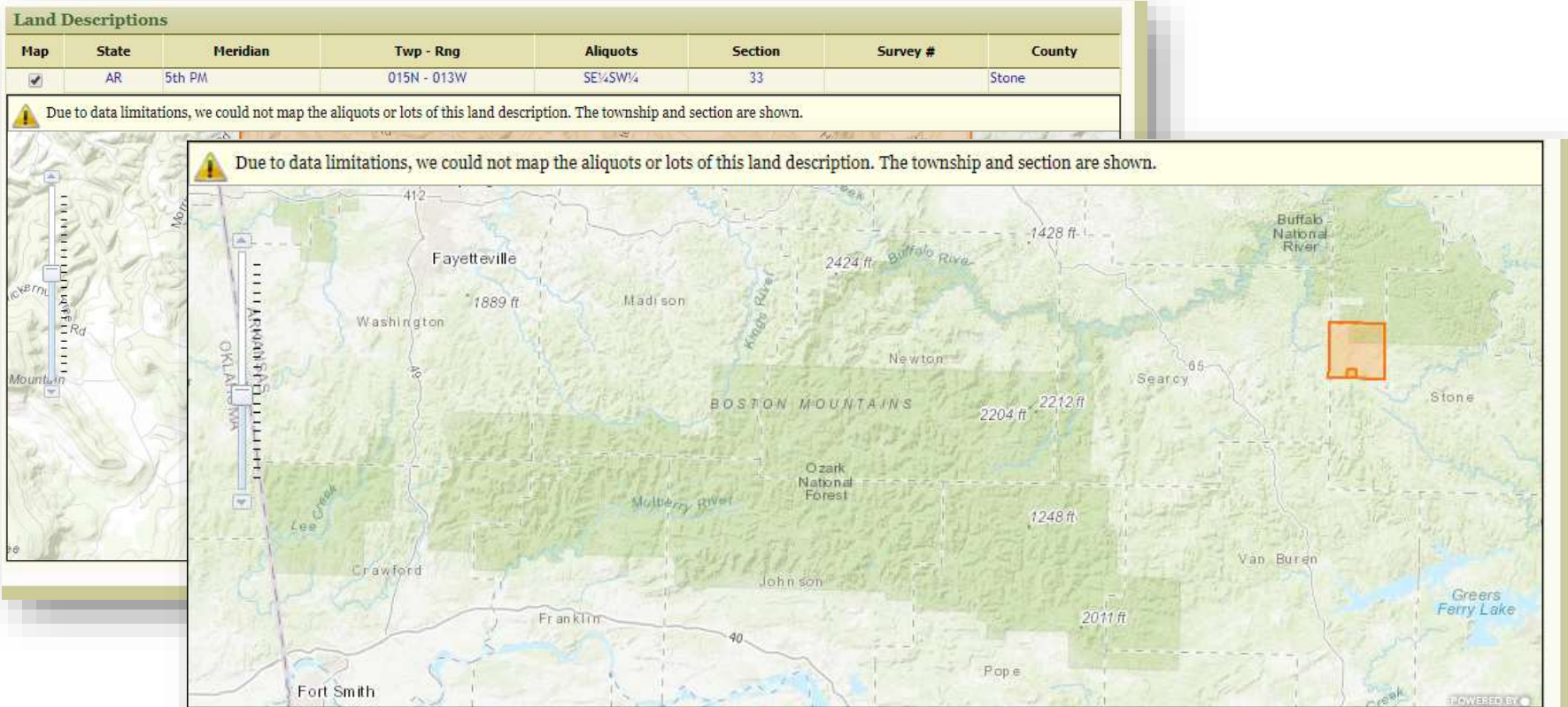
I was born in Walker Co. Georgia, near Lafayette, the county seat, on December 1st, 1848. My life passed pleasantly and uneventfully as most children' [s lives] do until the Summer of '59 when my parents began to talk of moving to Arkansas which was the topic of conversation of both men and women of our neighborhood. I well remember sitting for hours at a time listening to my parents and grand-parents, Uncles and Aunts, talk of the great west, meaning Arkansas. We, the children really believed it a paradise but oh, what a sad mistake.

It was finally decided that my father and his family and two uncles and their families were to move to Arkansas the ensuing Fall. My mother's parents were to follow in one or two years. My Grand-father was a well-to-do farmer, likewise he had a great deal of business to tend to before leaving Georgia. All was jubilant over the prospects except my poor grand-mother. She shed many bitter tears, it seemed as if she had a foreboding that she would never see her children any more but my grand-father assured her that she would soon be with them all again soon.

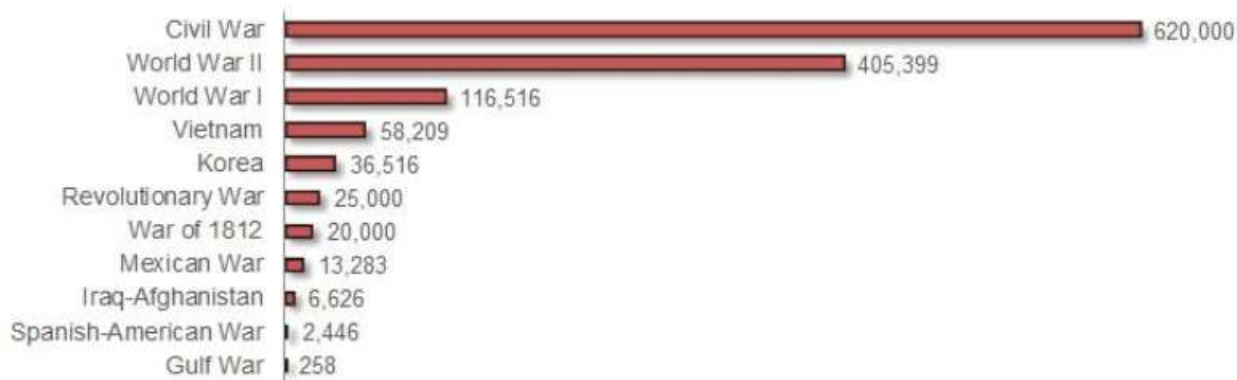
Some numbers for context

- U.S. population in 1860: about 31 million people
- 21 million in the north;
- 10 million in the south; includes about 4 million slaves
- In Union states, about 37% of the free male population enlisted in the Union, less than 1% in the Confederacy
- In Confederate states, 64% of the free male population enlisted in the Confederacy, 5% in the Union
- About 180,000 African Americans served in the Union Army



Q. How many soldiers died in the Civil War?

Approximately **620,000 soldiers** died from combat, accident, starvation, and disease during the Civil War. This number comes from an 1889 study of the war performed by William F. Fox and Thomas Leonard Livermore. Both men fought for the Union. Their estimate is derived from an exhaustive study of the combat and casualty records generated by the armies over five years of fighting. A recent study puts the number of dead as high as 850,000.

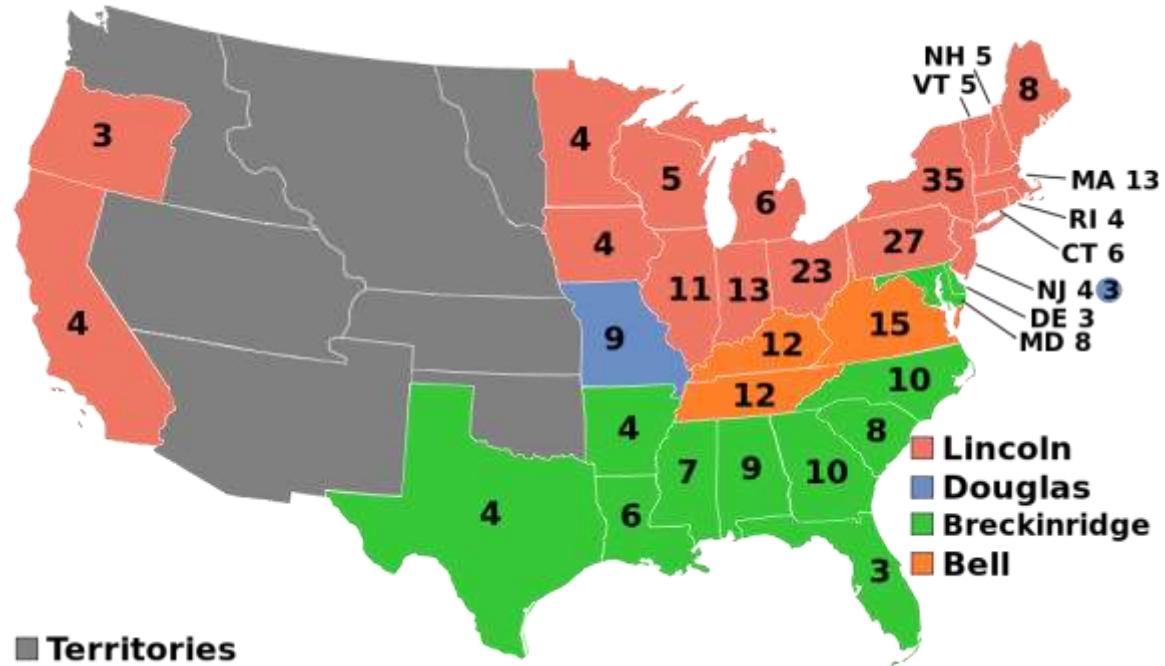

in the State of *Virginia*, and *eighteenth* 1847,
and by occupation a *Farmer* Do hereby acknowledge to have
volunteered this *seventeenth* day of *August*, 1864,
to serve as a *Soldier* in the Army of the United States of America, for
the period of *Three* YEARS, unless sooner discharged by proper authority:
Do also agree to accept such bounty, pay, rations, and clothing, as are, or may be,
established by law for volunteers. And I, *Solomon Ward*, do
solemnly swear, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the *United States*
of America, and that I will serve them honestly and faithfully against all
their enemies or opposers whomsoever; and that I will observe and obey the
orders of the President of the United States, and the orders of the officers
appointed over me, according to the Rules and Articles of War.

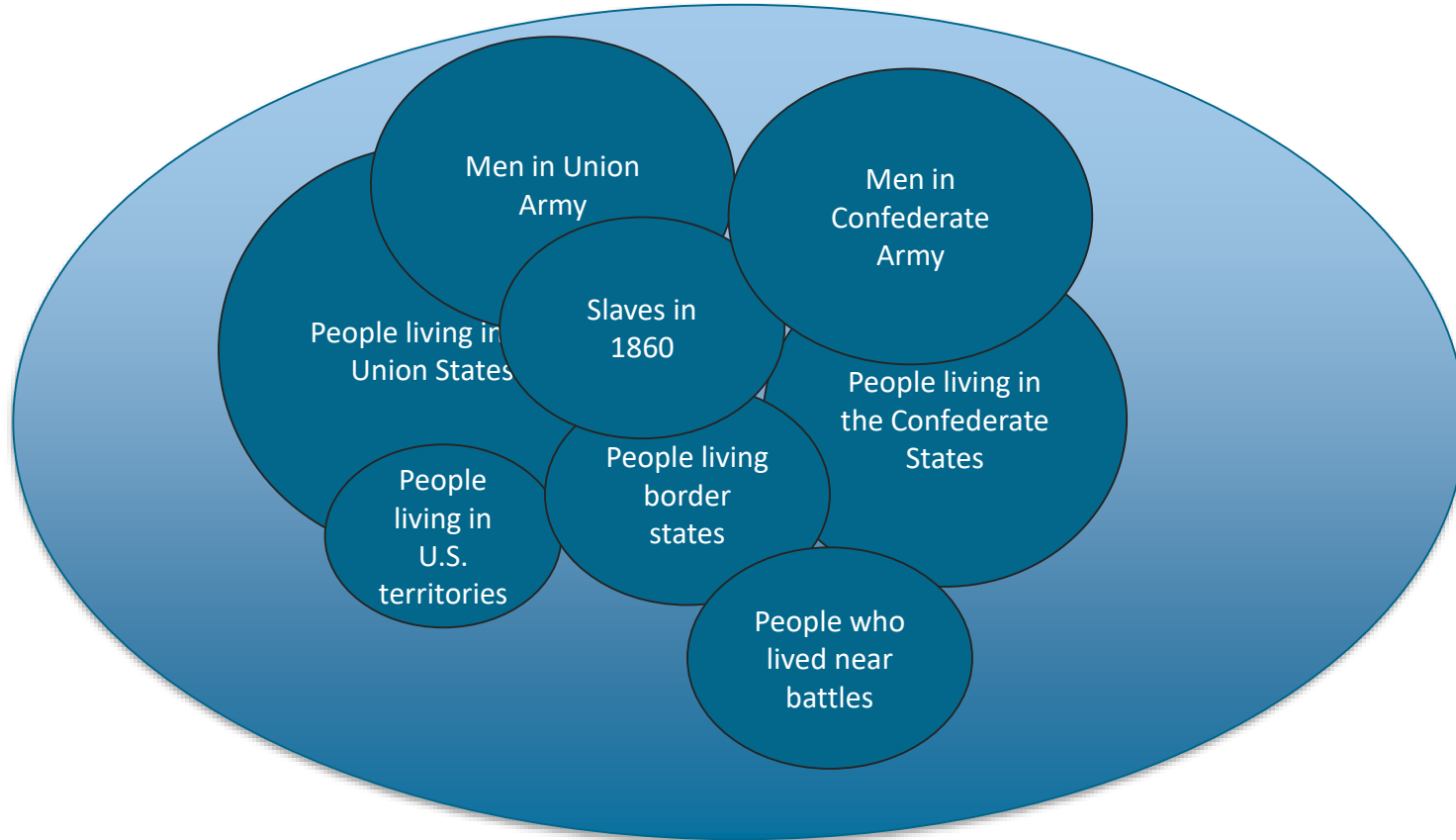

- Men who were in the United States in the 1860 census.

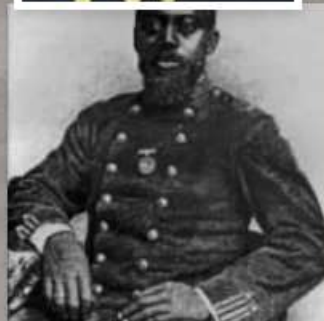

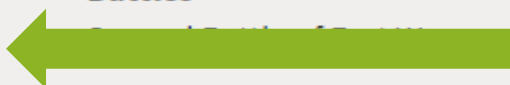

He was the first African-American to be recognized as having performed an act of bravery that warranted the awarding of the Congressional Medal of Honor. He was a member of Company C, 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry. On July 18, 1863, during the Battle of Fort Wagner, South Carolina, he was nearby when commander Colonel Robert G. Shaw was shot down. Summoning all of his strength, Carney held aloft the colors and continued the charge. Having been shot several times, he kept the colors flying high, and miraculously survived the struggle. It has been estimated that over half of the regiment became casualties in this deadly engagement, which was depicted in the movie "Glory" (1989).

**Gov Guild Ordered Flags on State
House Lowered to Half-Staff from
2 to 3 P M Today.**

An exceptional honor was paid the late Sergt William H. Carney, the medal of honor man, whose funeral takes place today in New Bedford. The sergeant, employed as a messenger in the office of the secretary of state, died as the result of an injury received in an elevator accident at the state house. The honor referred to, decreed by Gov Guild today, was that the flags on the state house be lower to half-staff between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Gov Guild also sent to New Bedford an official wreath. A beautiful wreath of liberty roses, maidenhair fern, asparagus fern, calyx and lilies of the valley was sent by the sergeant's associates in the secretary's office.

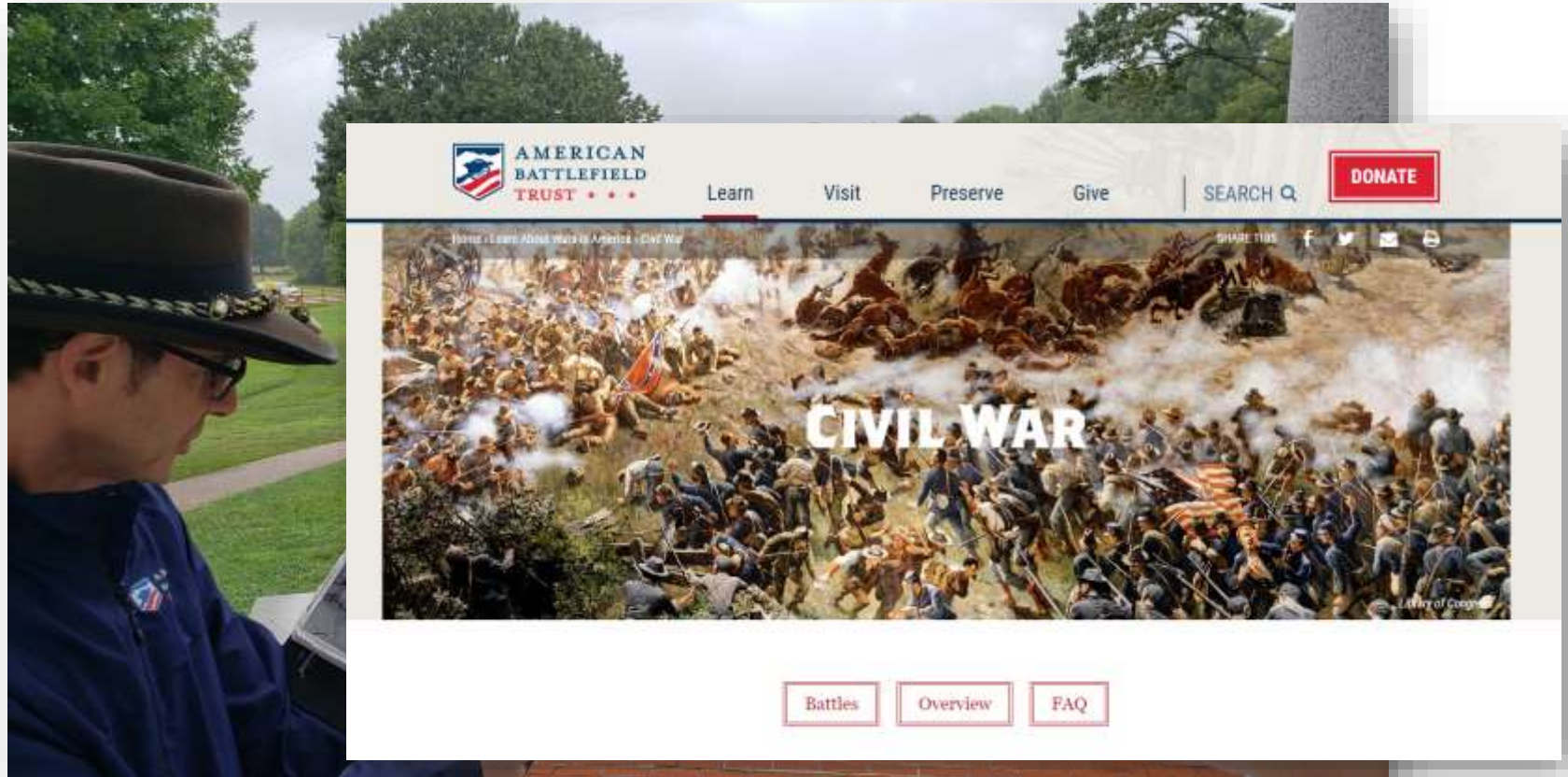

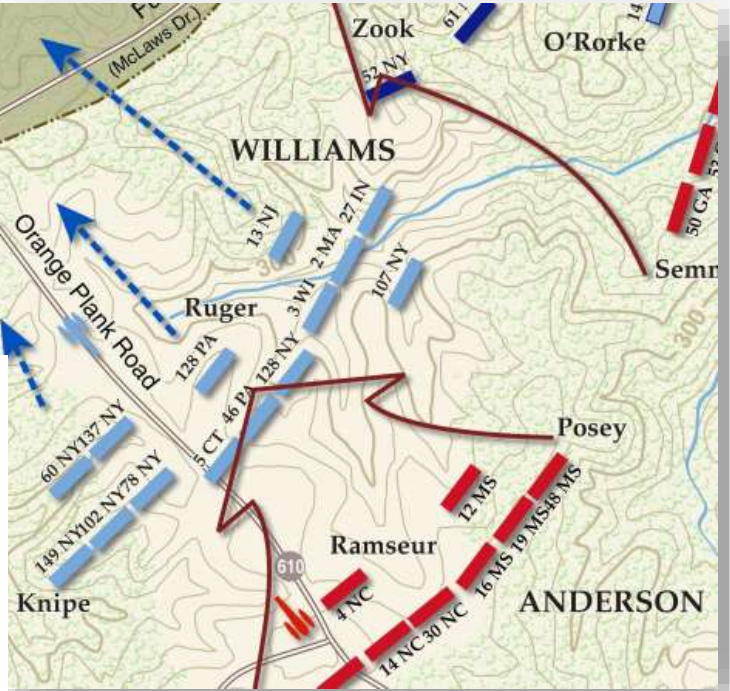

The Battle of Fort Wagner

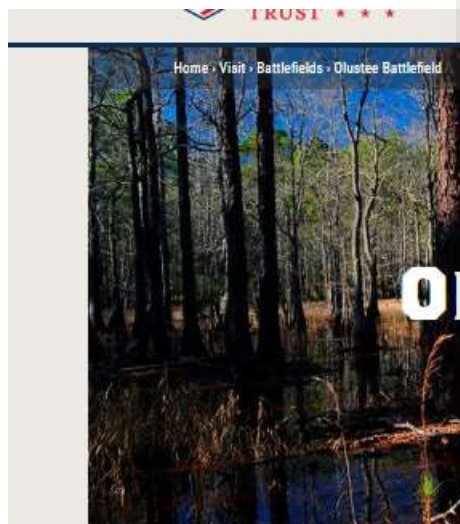
After the successful amphibious operation against Fort Royal and the stunning, long range artillery bombardment that led to the swift capture of Fort Pulaski, Brig. Gen. Quincy Gillmore was assigned to lead the 1863 campaign against the city of Charleston, South Carolina. Gillmore, who graduated first in his West Point class of 1849, was a rising star within the Union ranks.

Gillmore's plan, supported by a heavy naval presence, was to seize Morris Island so that he could place heavy rifled guns on Cummings Point that would in turn eliminate the Confederate stronghold at nearby Fort Sumter. Once Sumter was reduced, the army and the navy could move swiftly to capture Charleston, the birthplace of the rebellion.





Olustee, Florida, 20 Feb 1864



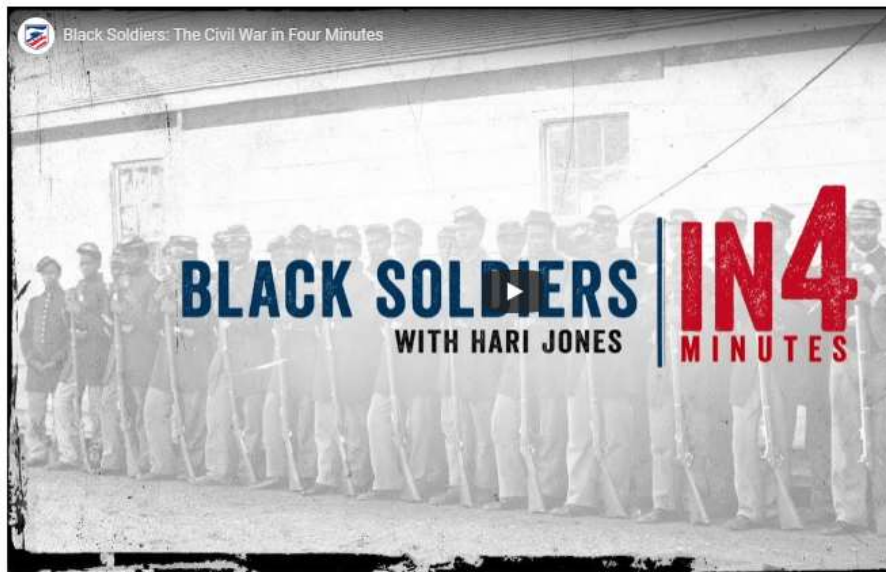
In February 1864, the commander of the Union Department of the South, Maj. Gen. Quincy A. Gillmore, launched an expedition into Florida to secure Union enclaves, sever Rebel supply routes, and recruit black soldiers. Brig. Gen. Truman Seymour moved his 5,500-man force from Jacksonville deep into the state, meeting little resistance. On February 20th, as he advanced toward Lake City, he approached Brig. Gen. Joseph Finegan's 5,000 Confederates entrenched in an open pine woods near Olustee. Finegan sent forward one infantry brigade to meet Seymour's advance units. The Union forces attacked but were repulsed. Seymour, believing he was attacking Florida militia units, sent in his forces piecemeal. The battle raged, and as Finegan committed the last of his reserves, the Union line broke and began to retreat. Finegan did not fully exploit the withdrawal, however, some of his men attempted to engage the rear element of Seymour's forces just before nightfall, and were repulsed by elements of the 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry Regiment and the 35th United States Colored Troops. According to some Confederate memoirs and letters, Confederate troops killed most of the wounded and captured black Union soldiers. The Union losses caused Northern authorities to question the necessity of further Union involvement in the militarily insignificant state of Florida.

COMPANY "G" 14TH VIRGINIA CAVALRY

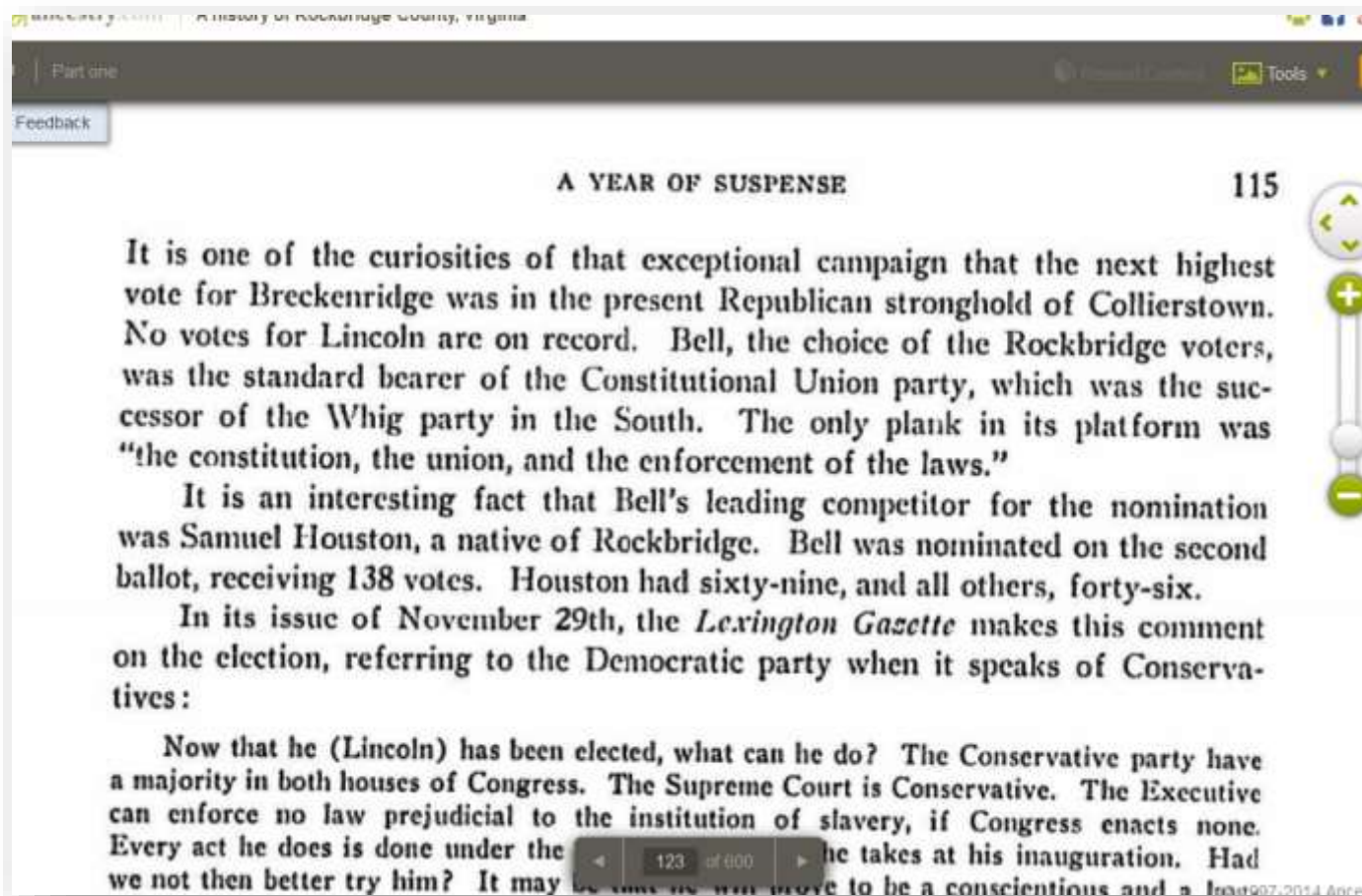



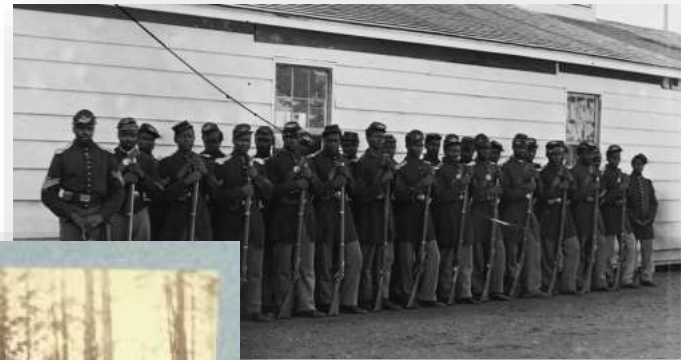
